

PUBLIC FINANCE AND PUBLIC DEBT REPORT, FEBRUARY 2010

The public finance and public debt preliminary results as of February 2010 were released today.

The main results during the January-February period are the following:

- **The public sector posted a Ps. 22.9 billion surplus and if PEMEX's investment is excluded the public balance would register a surplus of Ps. 63.9 billion, results consistent with the approved public deficit for the year.**
- **Budgetary revenues were higher by 8.1 percent in real annual terms with respect to the same period of last year, due mainly to higher oil and non-oil tax revenues that increased by 20.7 and 12.7 percent in real annual terms, respectively.**
- **Net expenditures increased by 1.4 percent in real annual terms with respect to the same period of the previous year. Within programmable expenditures, higher resources were channeled to education, social security, social assistance and energy.**
- **Federalized expenditures increased by 0.9 percent in real annual terms with respect to the January-February period of 2009. Shared revenues increased by 21.8 percent.**
- **The Federal Public Sector's net domestic debt decreased by Ps. 25.0 billion and the Federal Public Sector's net external debt increased by US\$ 2.5 billion with respect to the end of 2009.**

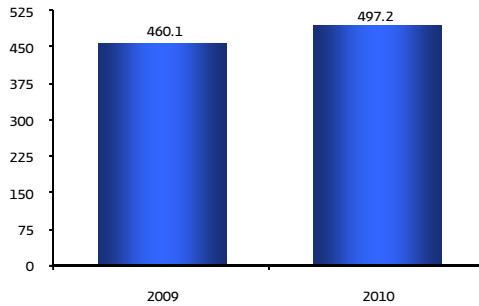
Evolution of the Public Finances during January-February

As of February 2010, the Public Sector's balance posted a surplus of Ps. 22.9 billion. The primary balance posted a Ps. 49.6 billion surplus. If PEMEX's investment is excluded, the public sector's balance would register a Ps. 63.9 billion surplus. These results are consistent with the approved deficit for 2010, in compliance with Article 17 of the Federal Budget and Fiscal Responsibility Law.

Public Sector Budgetary Revenues during January-February

The public sector's budgetary revenues were Ps. 497.2 billion, amount 8.1 percent higher in real terms than the one registered during the same period of the previous year. The evolution of the main components of budgetary revenues was the following:

- Non-oil tax revenues were Ps. 253.5 billion, amount 12.7 percent higher in real terms than that observed during the January-February period of the previous year. VAT and Income tax collection (which includes the IETU and the Tax on Cash Deposits) increased by 20.0 and 8.4 percent in real terms, respectively.
- Oil related revenues (which include PEMEX's own revenues, royalties and fees, excise tax collection on gasoline and diesel, and the tax on oil returns) totaled Ps. 146.5 billion, amount that is 20.7 percent higher in real terms than that registered in the same period of 2009. This result is explained mainly by the increase in the price of the Mexican oil mix (71.1 dpb compared with 35.5 dpb observed in the same period of last year), which was partially offset by the appreciation of the exchange rate by 9.9 percent with respect to the same period of the previous year, a higher price of gasoline imports by 69.4 percent and the declines in the oil production and export platforms of 3.6 and 10.0 percent, respectively.
- Revenues of public entities under direct budgetary control other than PEMEX were Ps. 67.5 billion, which represented a decrease of 7.9 percent in real terms with

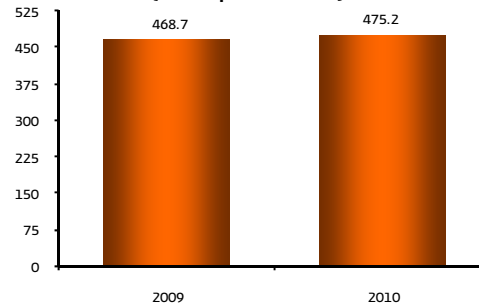
respect to those registered in the same period of the previous year. This is mainly explained by a lower average price of electricity.

- Non-tax non-oil revenues totaled Ps. 29.6 billion, amount lower by 26.7 percent in real terms with respect to the same period of the previous year.

Net Budgetary Public Sector Expenditures during January-February

During the first two months of the year, the net budgetary expenditures of the public sector totaled Ps. 475.2 billion, amount 1.4 percent higher in real terms than the one observed in the same period of 2009.

Paid programmable expenditures totaled Ps. 344.5 billion, amount 2.0 percent lower in real terms than the one observed in the same period of the previous year, partly due to the effort to anticipate expenditures as part of the countercyclical measures adopted during 2009. Within this item, worth highlighting are the resources channeled to education, social security, social assistance, science and technology, as well as investment in the energy sector.

Shared revenues allocated to Federal Entities and Municipalities through shared revenues, decentralization agreements and reallocations increased by 0.9 percent in real terms. Shared revenues increased by 21.8 percent in real terms due to higher Federal shareable revenues, while the remainder of the resources distributed to Federal Entities and Municipalities decreased by 11.8 percent in real annual terms.

The Public Sector's financial cost was Ps. 24.6 billion, amount 26.0 percent lower in real terms than the one registered in the same period of last year, due to lower interest rates and the appreciation of the exchange rate.

Stock of Public Debt as of February

At the end of February, the Federal Government's net domestic debt was Ps. 2,470.9 billion, amount that is Ps. 0.5 billion lower than that observed at the end of 2009. The change in the stock is explained by net indebtedness of Ps. 56.5 billion, upward adjustments to the inflation indexed debt by Ps. 11.0 billion and an increase in the Federal Government's financial assets by Ps. 68.0 billion.

The stock of the Federal Government's net external debt in February was US\$ 46.8 billion, amount US\$ 0.6 billion higher than the one observed at the end of 2009. This result is explained by a net amortization of US\$ 0.2 billion, by downward accounting adjustments by US\$ 0.2 billion and a decrease in financial assets in foreign currency by US\$ 1.0 billion.

The stock of the Federal Public Sector's net domestic debt (Federal Government, PEDBC's and development banks) at the end of February was Ps. 2,569.1 billion, which implies a decrease of Ps. 25.0 billion with respect to the stock recorded at the end of 2009. This is due to net domestic indebtedness during the period

of Ps. 50.5 billion, upward accounting adjustments by Ps. 11.5 billion and an increase in the non-financial Public Sector's assets by Ps. 86.9 billion.

The stock of the Federal Public Sector's net external debt was US\$ 94.2 billion, amount that is higher by US\$ 2.5 billion than the one registered at the end of 2009. This result is explained by a net external borrowing of US\$ 1.2 billion, as well as downward accounting adjustments by US\$ 0.5 billion and a decrease in foreign financial assets by US\$ 1.8 billion.
